Masks are worn in the classroom, sanitizing hands and tools is a regular activity and students have worked to make their classmates and instructors their primary bubble. The SketchUp for Timber Framers computer design workshops were limited in size but so popular that the school added more courses to meet the demand.

In all three Big Wood courses: Log Building, Timber Frame Post and Beam and Timber Frame Hammer Bents, there was only one seat in one course that was not taken. The end result is a crop of graduates who are excited about adding Log and Timber skills to their toolboxes, whether it's with the end goal of working in industry, building their own structures or designing for clients.
